Credit/No Credit Courses

Washburn Law students must normally complete a minimum of 69 credit hours in courses in which a letter grade is received. Students may petition the Associate Dean for Academic Affairs to take fewer credit hours in courses in which a letter grade is received. In no circumstance shall the Associate Dean for Academic Affairs be permitted to allow a student to take less than 64 credits in regularly scheduled classroom or direct faculty instruction.

Courses that are credit/no credit are identified as such in their course's descriptions. To receive credit in a credit/no credit course, a student's performance must be the equivalent of a grade of "C" or better.
