Prof. McEowen will also be available to discuss
interesting changes at his law school developed to
target the loss of attorneys in rural areas. For
example, Washburn presently has an extensive Rural
Law Program and has the most extensive effort of any
law school in the U.S. to place attorneys in rural areas.
The first aspect involves the immersion of students in
a full summer
of full-time rural law practice. The student will do
normal research, writing and legal work, but are also
expected to go out and get involved in
the community as they see what the full nature of rural
legal work entails. At this time, students in northwest
Kansas are under a program where they
have the six hours of credit paid for and get a \$5,000
stipend to cover their travel and living expenses over
the summer. The second program expands the
externship program so that a student can do a full-year
externship in their third year of law school in a rural
community (any rural area) under the supervision of a
licensed lawyer. Students will work 20 hours per
week in a rural practice setting and complete other law
school coursework online.
