BIOGRAPHY

Daniel Bodansky is Regents Professor at the Sandra Day O'Connor College of Law, Arizona State University. He is the author of *The Art and Craft of International Environmental Law*, which received the 2011 Harold & Margaret Sprout Award from the International Studies Association. Bodansky co-authored *International Climate Change Law*, which received the 2018 Certificate of Merit (specialized area of international law) from the American Society of International Law. Prior to joining the ASU faculty in 2010, he taught at the University of Washington from 1989-1999, served as Climate Change Coordinator at the U.S. State Department from 1999-2001, and held the Woodruff Chair of International Law at the University of Georgia from 2002-2010. Bodansky is a member of the Council on Foreign Relations, served on the Board of Editors of the American Journal of International Law from 2001-2011, and is a graduate of Harvard (A.B.), Cambridge (M.Phil.), and Yale (J.D.).

ABSTRACT

Spring 2022 marks the thirtieth anniversary of the adoption of the UN Framework Convention on Climate Change. During the past thirty years, how has the UN climate change regime performed? How has it evolved? Has progress been made in addressing climate change? What lessons have we learned? And what are the regime's prospects going forward? This lecture will address these and other questions about the UN climate regime at age 30, including a personal retrospective.

The *Washburn Law Journal* has been Washburn University School of Law's flagship publication since 1960. The *Journal* is edited by a board of ten to thirteen editors and typically has a membership of about thirty-five students per year. Membership is based on a combination of law school grades and a writing competition. On average, the *Washburn Law Journal* publishes between eight and fourteen student Notes and Comments in each volume. Each year, three to six students present their work in a well-attended scholarly forum that generates lively discussion.

The *Washburn Law Journal* produces three issues a year, which make up one volume. One issue traditionally takes the theme of the Foulston Siefkin Lecture, which since 1978 has been sponsored by the Wichita-based firm of Foulston Siefkin LLP. A second issue usually falls under the Board of Editors' creative control; and the third issue takes the theme of the Law School's annual symposium, which is co-sponsored by the *Journal*. The *Journal* is frequently cited by the Kansas Supreme Court and Court of Appeals, as well as by numerous other scholarly publications.
