Deadlines and fees:

- For July examination, applications are due by March 1 (\$700 fee) or April 1 (+ \$200 late fee)
- For February examination, applications are due by October 1 (\$700 fee) or November 1 (+ \$200 late fee) *Applications:*
 - To sit for the Kansas bar examination, complete the Application under Rule 716 for Admission by Examination available via the online portal.
 - For Admission under Rule 717 by UBE Score Transfer from Another Jurisdiction (\$1250 fee), complete the appropriate application available via the online portal.

Deadlines and fees:

- For July examination, applications are due by March 1 (\$910 fee), April 1 (\$1035 fee), May 1 (\$1215 fee), or May 31 (\$1470 fee)
- For February examination, applications are due by October 1 (\$910 fee), November 1 (\$1035 fee), December 1 (\$1215 fee) or December 31 (\$1470 fee)

Uniform Bar Examination (UBE)

40 jurisdictions, including Kansas, Missouri, Colorado, and Texas have adopted the UBE, which allows for easy portability and bar admission in multiple states based upon one examination.

Each UBE jurisdiction is allowed to set its own score necessary for admission and each jurisdiction is allowed to set its own time limit for accepting a UBE score (for example, some states will only accept a score that is less than 2 years old). http://www.ncbex.org/exams/ube/score-portability/maximum-score-age/

UBE jurisdictions and minimum scores: Alabama (260); Alaska (280); Arizona (273); Arkansas (270); Colorado (276); Connecticut (266); District of Columbia (266); Idaho (272); Illinois (266); Indiana (264); Iowa (266); Kansas (266); Kentucky (266); Maine (270); Maryland (266); Massachusetts (270); Minnesota (260); Missouri (260); Montana (266); Nebraska (270); New Hampshire (270); New Jersey (266); New Mexico (260); New York (266); North Carolina (270); North Dakota (260); Ohio (270); Oklahoma (264); Oregon (270); Pennsylvania (272); Rhode Island (270); South Carolina (266); Tennessee (270); Texas (270); Utah (270); Vermont (270); Washington (270); West Virginia (270); Wyoming (270); U.S. Virgin Islands (266).

Many states, including Colorado, New York, Missouri, and Texas, also require a **state-specific component** before admission. For more information, visit http://www.ncbex.org/exams/ube/score-portability/local-components/.

All states also require character and fitness certification and a certain score on the MPRE. It may take as long as 3-6 months for admission based upon a transferred UBE score. Note: Under the Kansas, Missouri, Texas and some other states' UBE score transfer rules, you can apply to sit for the bar examination in a different UBE state and apply to transfer that UBE score to Kansas, Missouri, or Texas concurrently before you actually sit for the bar exam and earn the UBE score. The benefit is that you could be licensed in both states immediately after receiving your UBE score without having to wait for the second state to conduct its independent character & fitness investigation. The drawback is if you do not receive the score that would allow for admission to Kansas, Missouri, or Texas, you've forfeited the UBE score transfer application fee (as much as \$1250). A few other jurisdictions also allow for admission by transferring an as yet unearned score – talk to Tammy King in the PDO for more information.

Multistate Professional Responsibility Examination (MPRE)

- Required for admission to the bar in all US jurisdictions except Wisconsin and Puerto Rico
- Offered each March, August, and October/November but registration deadlines are roughly 1 ½ to 2 months prior to the exam date. *If you need test accommodations,* register *well in advance* of the registration deadline.
- To register, visit http://www.ncbex.org/exams/mpre/registration/
- The MPRE is a computer-based examination offered at Pearson VUE testing center locations. Register early to ensure that you receive your preferred testing location, as space may fill up at individual locations.
- Missouri and Kansas require an MPRE score of 80; Colorado and Texas require an 85
- Check your jurisdiction's rules regarding timing of MPRE passing score requirements some states require that
 you have a passing score on file at the time of your bar application or you must pay a late fee. Kansas requires
 receipt of a passing score prior to sitting for the bar examination. Missouri, Colorado, and Texas all allow you to
 take the MPRE for various lengths of time after the bar exam; however, you cannot be admitted to practice until
 you receive a passing MPRE score.
- Take the MPRE well before you plan to sit for the bar examination in order to retake the MPRE if necessary to
 achieve the required score. Ideally, take the MPRE as soon as possible after taking Professional Responsibility.
 Note: Colorado will not accept MPRE scores that are more than 2 years old.
